## IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM THE TEAM AT ARATAKI VISITORS CENTRE

From Tuesday 27 February, Auckland Transport will begin the muchneeded repairs on the Scenic Drive slips closest to Titirangi Village. Unfortunately, that means that Scenic Drive will be closed from the Titirangi village roundabout to Woodlands Park Road for 3-4 months.

Please see on next page the diversion that will be in place from the roundabout. Other options for reaching us at Arataki Visitor Centre include coming from Shaw Road, or from Konini Road onto Scenic Drive.

Rest assured we continue to remain open every day from 9am – 5pm to welcome visitors, and please do continue to support us while these important works take place!

#### Scenic Drive to Titirangi Road

- Head southwest on Woodlands Park Rd 34 m
- Turn right to stay on Woodlands Park Rd 1.0 km
- Turn right to stay on Woodlands Park Rd 1.3 km
- · At the roundabout, take the 1st exit onto Huia Rd
- Destination will be on the right 3.1 km



#### **CLUB NIGHT TUESDAY 5th March 2024**

#### 7:30 pm, St Mark's Parish Hall, Remuera Road

On Tuesday evening a group of Afghans from the Hazara ethnic community will be sharing their experiences of evacuation from Afghanistan to New Zealand in September 2021 following the Taliban takeover.

Prior to that the group were employed on various livelihood enhancement projects delivered by the Aga Khan Foundation and funded by the New Zealand Government. NZAID/MFAT delivered the Aid programme in Afghanistan primarily in Bamiyan where the New Zealand Defence force NZDF had a provincial reconstruction team based there. One of the projects was the Bamiyan Eco tourism project which was very successful and resulted in a variety of activities/events including skiing tours, cultural activities, and organizing the first international marathon in Afghanistan (Bamiyan).

Since arriving in New Zealand the group has been focusing on ways to support the Afghan community integrate into New Zealand life with dignity to reach their full potential as educated, culturally informed citizens who can contribute to New Zealand society. Recently they established Timatangahou (New Beginnings) Foundation, a charitable trust which aims to do this through a variety of activities with a clear focus on women and girls. One of the first activities is organizing the Aotearoa -Afghanistan Marathon to be staged at Riverhead Forest on 17 November this year. Other New Zealand activities they hope to achieve include mountaineering and skiing programs for women and girls.

Outside of the Trust some members of the group have established A2A Journey – a tourist company aimed at promoting tours to Afghanistan and other central and south Asian countries. One of these tours is trekking in the Wakhan Valley in the Hindu Cush, one of the most remote and fascinating trekking locations anywhere. The group wants to share these activities with a view to sparking interest and support for this venture. These evacuees are a highly motivated and talented group of entrepreneurs who have achieved in a very challenging environment. Come and hear their story. You might like to get involved.

## Trip Report – Ruapehu Working Bee 3<sup>rd</sup>– 4<sup>th</sup> February 2024

This was the first Ruapehu working bee I've taken part in for a long time and I really enjoyed it. Preparation was the key and I was glad I'd packed all our ski gear, despite the sweltering weather in Auckland. After a pleasant drive down, we stopped opposite the Chateau and changed into all our warm gear. This was a good idea, because when we arrived at the Top o' the Bruce at 8.30pm the wind was so strong we could barely stand up. The visibility was also negligible. However, I was confident I knew the way and the marker poles were indispensable. Nicolas, Johann, John and Jackie arrived a few hours later and also had a scary walk up to the hut in dark and storm. We all knew the way very well, but it highlighted to us how dangerous the weather conditions on the mountain can be (even on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of February!) and that new club members who are arriving for the first time should always be met and guided by experienced members. Clara (10) and Lukas (7) were remarkably cheerful throughout the whole experience.



The bad weather continued on Saturday and we spent our time indoors, completing the stocktake and other indoor jobs.

At some point it hailed, and Clara and Lukas collected hail to make Raro slushies for the team. Later in the day it snowed, creating a beautiful picture the following morning. We worked hard on the Sunday morning then enjoyed a gorgeous walk to Silica Rapids in brilliant sunshine in the afternoon. Nicholas, Johann and John drove home on Sunday but the rest of us had the luxury of staying an extra night.














#### Heaphy Track walk a report by Bart Schroder

Bart Schroder and Brian Duffy along with a few others (including my sister) walked the Heaphy track in the middle of Feb. The weather was great, the track quality is a highway, the huts are magnificent. We walked it over 3 nights with a half day either side. Be prepared for some distance – the longest day was 24.5km, and I and my sister probably did around 83 km what with searches for good swimming and such.

The huts are magnificent compared with your average back country hut – flush toilets without having to go out in the rain (there wasn't any), gas cooking with gas, lighting in the kitchen/dining areas, and 8 bed bunkrooms. The Heaphy Hut was sited like a hotel, with an imposing wide sweep of lawn down to the spectacular Heaphy river.

We did it in the order Perry Saddle, James Mackay, then Heaphy hut and out. I think we should probably have done it in 4 nights instead, and stayed at Saxon Hut as well and done some side trips to smell the roses.

The highlight for me was the area around the Heaphy hut. The river is fabulous, and the meeting point between the river and the Tasman sea mesmerizing. The coastal track is a real West Coast one, you must fossick – there is much to find!

The two bridges near the very well appointed Lewis shelter are amazing structures. Talking to the DOC guy there we learnt of the night in Feb 22 as he watched the old Heaphy River bridge being turned over by all the debris in the river, and disappear down the river. Now they have two bridges – the first over the Lewis River and the second over the Heaphy opened late last year.

As you walk out you pass by the very well appointed Scotts Beach campsite – an excellent over nighter if you were coming up from Karamea for a day.

The walk up to Perry Saddle has some pretty good vistas:



We walked on up to Perry Saddle hut, with big verandahs around it, double glazed mozzi proof windows, flush toilets and a pretty good view.

The walking was easy, all the inclines were gentle, and DOC had bridged every little creek.



The Gouland Downes were wide and flat with views, most of the rest of the time we were in the bush.




There were lots of little bridges and some good swimming

The Heaphy Hut was sited like a hotel:




With great views down to the Heaphy river meeting the sea:
