Thurday 28 August 2025 – Westmere, Western Springs & Arch Hill – Linda Webber

Start 10 am – Park Garnet Rd Westmere near #190-198 or angle park on other side of road - Approx 9.5kms.

Weona-Westmere Coastal Walkway, Jaggers Bush, Old Mill Rd, Arch Hill Reserve and path, Nixon Park (lunch), return via Kingsland roads, Western Springs, Jaggers Bush back to cars.

Saturday to Sunday 6-7 September 2025 – Winter Tongariro Crossing – Mark Roberts

Join Mark for this classic trip under Winter conditions. Participants must have had experience with crampoons & ice axe. Helmets, ice axe & crampoons will be mandatory for this trip, these can be rented from the club. It could either be a long day crossing (19km) or split into two with an overnight at the cosy Oturere hut depending on weather & party interest. This trip will only be going ahead if the weather forecast is reasonable.

Thursday 11 September 2025 – Narrow Neck Beach to Devonport – Theresa Kermode

Meet at the carpark at Narrow Neck Beach, Devonport, at 10 am.

We will follow Seabreeze Road, through Ngataringa Park, crossing the Navy sports ground, and then along Calliope Road to Devonport. Lunch stop will be on Mt Victoria. Then Cumbria Reserve, Cheltenham Beach, and back along the coast to Narrow Neck (low tide is at 1543).

Friday to Saturday 28-29 November 2025 - Kids Lightweight Overnighter @ Tunnel Point Campsite - Claire Jackson


Pack your gear and join Claire, Harper (8) and Jayde (12) for an overnight camping adventure in the beautiful Waitākere Ranges.

Join Claire, Harper (8) and Jayde (12) for an overnight adventure at Hot Water Beach Campsite, Lake Tarawera.

We're keeping it simple - at 9 am we'll load our bags, tents, and chilly bins onto the water taxi so they're taken straight to camp.

Then it's lighter going with a daypack along 15km of the scenic Tarawera Trail. Expect 5–6 hours of walking (for fit kids) with plenty of spots to stop for a swim and take in the lake views. The trip suits a mix of walking abilities - you can walk in, walk out, do both, or take the water taxi one way.

Arrive at camp, soak in the natural hot pools, have a relaxed dinner, and watch the sunset over the lake. On Sunday morning, we'll cruise back across the lake by water taxi to end the adventure (see Facebook page for details).

Friday 26 December 2025 – Saturday 3 January 2026 **Advance Notice** - Summer Camp 2025 – Coroglen – Peter Jemmett

Come and join in the tradition! This year's camp is in a gorgeous valley in the Coromandel. Just over 2-hour's drive from Auckland and up-river from the famous Coroglen Tavern (fish-and-chips, ice creams, beer). The campsite has two spacious fields and is next to a beautiful native-bush fringed stream. The stream has multiple swimming holes and will be perfect for aqua-tramping and floating down the river on boogie boards. Coroglen is in easy reach of multiple tramping and mountain biking possibilities, Hot Water Beach, Hahei, Cook's Beach, Whitianga and Tairua.



The property has a Glamping site for one lucky couple (including tent, queen bed, hot shower, BBQ and own toilet) at \$160/night + cleaning fee. Otherwise, campers need to bring everything they need for camping and cooking for themselves. Port-a-loos will be provided. There is a tap with stream-water.

A range of trips and activities are offered every day. Highlights include Summer Camp traditions such as the children's sing-song, New Year's Eve talent show and New Year's Day games (including three legged race, egg and spoon, running, cycling and tug of war). Summer Camp is a highlight of the calendar. You will need to be a current ASC member to reserve a spot, though friends and relations can attend as your guests.

A deposit of two nights' fee will secure a spot.



Trip Reports

Thursday 26 June 2025 - Duder Regional Park - Mike Frith



When Mike Frith led a group of Manurewa Scouts to Duder Peninsular around 1985 he had no idea that he would be returning 40 years later as the leader of 24 members on an Alpine Sports Club Thursday walk. The beaches on the coastline are a treat but the number one attraction remains the abandoned pa site at the end of the peninsula. It has become so popular that those with a fear of heights are advised against visiting the site.

For whatever reason a couple of our octogenarians elected to stay behind and watched the more intrepid members of the party do their thing.



Sunday 3 August 2025 – Coast to Coast – Combined Sunday Walkers, Rangatahi Ramblers and Small People on Big Hills – Susan Stephens and Miranda Hutton

By happy coincidence, the youth Rangatahi Ramblers and Sunday Walkers combined on a gorgeous, sunny Sunday in August. 40 people met at 9.30am opposite the downtown Ferry Building to walk the Auckland Coast to Coast 16km route. After walking up Queen Street, we turned left to reach Albert Park. Boyd Miller explained how geology formed the land and showed us where the original volcanic crater was, now under a parking building. We heard about tunnels dug under Albert Park in WW2. After a short history lesson given by John Hutton, we walked behind the University Library, past the 1840's barracks wall and the recent sculpture to honour the victims of the 2019 Christchurch Mosque attack.



Walking down Grafton Rd, we reached Lover's Walk in the Domain and enjoyed the bush and its tranquillity. Boyd told us about the Duck Pond and how the volcanic structure of the surrounding land formed the spring, modern Auckland City's first water source. We enjoyed morning tea at the Grandstand, overlooking teams playing Sunday sport.

Mountain Road took us past Auckland Grammar School to Maungawhau/Mt Eden. Here, the younger walkers needed to stop for lunch and spent time sitting on the magnificent platform enjoying the view of the city and the

Waitematā Harbour (Pacific Ocean). The Sunday Walkers were keen to push on, so we divided the party into two groups.



The Rangatahi Ramblers continued, somewhat refreshed, to walk through Mt Eden Village. Walking through the former Faculty of Education and Social Work, the now abandoned campus felt as if the students had only just left. Established in 1926, and used till the end of 2023, the students and teachers relocated to the Auckland City campus at the start of 2024. It was special to walk among the mature trees and hotch-potch mix of buildings which have housed nearly 100-years of education and learning.

After a quick play at the Melville Park playground and use of the facilities, we pushed on to Puriri Drive and Maungakiekie/One Tree Hill. Here we met a fresh contingent of 14 Small People on Big Hills who joined us to finish the Coast to Coast. After delicious ice creams and a good break, we walked overland to the summit, then down via billowing mounds of kikuyu grass, taking a short-cut behind the Archery Club. We walked through the Grotto, a mini grove of native trees and ferns, then down Grand Drive, and down Onehunga Mall to the train station. Here, some chose to end the trip and others continued to reach the Manukau Harbour (Tasman Sea). What an achievement! A beautiful winter's day walk in perfect weather with great company.
